

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#### Important Information

## For your safety

To prevent severe injury and loss of life/ property, read this section carefully before using the product to ensure proper and safe operation of your product.

## 

#### **Power connection**

- Use only the power source marked on the product.
- Do not overload power outlets and extension cords. This can result in the risk of fire or electric shock.
- Completely insert the AC adaptor/power plug into the power outlet. Failure to do so may cause electric shock and/or excessive heat resulting in a fire.
- Regularly remove any dust, etc. from the AC adaptor/power plug by pulling it from the power outlet, then wiping with a dry cloth. Accumulated dust may cause an insulation defect from moisture, etc. resulting in a fire.
- Unplug the product from power outlets if it emits smoke, an abnormal smell, or makes an unusual noise. These conditions can cause fire or electric shock. Confirm that smoke has stopped emitting and contact an authorised service centre.
- Unplug from power outlets and never touch the inside of the product if its casing has been broken open.
- Never touch the plug with wet hands. Danger of electric shock exists.

#### Installation

- To prevent the risk of fire or electrical shock, do not expose the product to rain or any type of moisture.
- Do not place or use this product near automatically controlled devices such as automatic doors and fire alarms. Radio waves emitted from this product may cause such devices to malfunction resulting in an accident.

 Do not allow the AC adaptor or telephone line cord to be excessively pulled, bent or placed under heavy objects.

#### Operating safeguards

- Unplug the product from power outlets before cleaning. Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners.
- Do not disassemble the product.
- Do not spill liquids (detergents, cleansers, etc.) onto the telephone line cord plug, or allow it to become wet at all. This may cause a fire. If the telephone line cord plug becomes wet, immediately pull it from the telephone wall jack, and do not use.

#### Medical

- Consult the manufacturer of any personal medical devices, such as pacemakers or hearing aids, to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF (radio frequency) energy. (The product operates in the frequency range of 1.88 GHz to 1.90 GHz, and the RF transmission power is 250 mW (max.).)

#### Installation and location

- Never install telephone wiring during an electrical storm.
- Never install telephone line jacks in wet locations unless the jack is specifically designed for wet locations.
- Never touch uninsulated telephone wires or terminals unless the telephone line has been disconnected at the network interface.
- Use caution when installing or modifying telephone lines.
- The AC adaptor is used as the main disconnect device. Ensure that the AC outlet is installed near the product and is easily accessible.

#### Important Information

- This product is unable to make calls when:
  - the handset batteries need recharging or have failed.
  - there is a power failure.
  - the key lock feature is turned on.

#### Battery

- We recommend using the batteries noted on page 3. USE ONLY rechargeable Ni-MH batteries AAA (R03) size.
- Do not mix old and new batteries.
- Do not open or mutilate the batteries. Released electrolyte from the batteries is corrosive and may cause burns or injury to the eyes or skin. The electrolyte is toxic and may be harmful if swallowed.
- Exercise care when handling the batteries. Do not allow conductive materials such as rings, bracelets, or keys to touch the batteries, otherwise a short circuit may cause the batteries and/or the conductive material to overheat and cause burns.
- Charge the batteries provided with or identified for use with this product only, in accordance with the instructions and limitations specified in this manual.
- Only use a compatible base unit (or charger) to charge the batteries. Do not tamper with the base unit (or charger).
   Failure to follow these instructions may cause the batteries to swell or explode.

## Important safety instructions

When using your product, basic safety precautions should always be followed to reduce the risk of fire, electric shock, and injury to persons, including the following:

- Do not use this product near water for example, near a bathtub, washbowl, kitchen sink, or laundry tub, in a wet basement or near a swimming pool.

## For best performance

#### Base unit location/avoiding noise

The base unit and other compatible Panasonic units use radio waves to communicate with each other.

- For maximum coverage and noise-free communications, place your base unit:
  - at a convenient, high, and central location with no obstructions between the handset and base unit in an indoor environment.
  - away from electronic appliances such as TVs, radios, personal computers, wireless devices, or other phones.
  - facing away from radio frequency transmitters, such as external antennas of mobile phone cell stations. (Avoid putting the base unit on a bay window or near a window.)
- Coverage and voice quality depends on the local environmental conditions.
- If the reception for a base unit location is not satisfactory, move the base unit to another location for better reception.

#### Environment

- Keep the product away from electrical noise generating devices, such as fluorescent lamps and motors.
- The product should be kept free from excessive smoke, dust, high temperature, and vibration.
- The product should not be exposed to direct sunlight.
- Do not place heavy objects on top of the product.
- When you leave the product unused for a long period of time, unplug the product from the power outlet.
- The product should be kept away from heat sources such as radiators, cookers, etc. It

should not be placed in rooms where the temperature is less than 0  $^\circ\text{C}$  or greater than 40  $^\circ\text{C}$ . Damp basements should also be avoided.

- The maximum calling distance may be shortened when the product is used in the following places: Near obstacles such as hills, tunnels, underground, near metal objects such as wire fences, etc.
- Operating the product near electrical appliances may cause interference. Move away from the electrical appliances.

#### Routine care

- Wipe the outer surface of the product with a soft moist cloth.
- Do not use benzine, thinner, or any abrasive powder.



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
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## Setting up

### Connections

#### Base unit

- Connect the AC adaptor to the unit by pressing the plug firmly.
- 2 Fasten the cord by hooking it.
- ③ Connect the AC adaptor to the power outlet.
- ④ Connect the telephone line cord to the unit, then to the telephone line jack until you hear a click.
- (5) A DSL/ADSL filter (not supplied) is required if you have a DSL/ADSL service.






#### Note:

- Use only the supplied Panasonic AC adaptor PNLV226CE.
- Use only the supplied telephone line cord.

#### Charger

 Connect the AC adaptor plug to the unit until you hear a click.  Connect the AC adaptor to the power outlet.




#### Note:

 Use only the supplied Panasonic AC adaptor PNLV233CE.

#### **Battery installation**

- USE ONLY rechargeable Ni-MH batteries AAA (R03) size ((A)).
- Do NOT use alkaline/manganese/Ni-Cd batteries.
- Confirm correct polarities (⊕, ⊖).



• Follow the directions on the display to set up the unit.

#### **Battery charging**

Charge for about 7 hours.

• Confirm "Charging" is displayed (A).

• When the batteries are fully charged, "Fully Charged" is displayed.



#### Note when setting up

#### Note for connections

- The AC adaptor must remain connected at all times. (It is normal for the adaptor to feel warm during use.)
- The AC adaptor should be connected to a vertically oriented or floor-mounted AC outlet. Do not connect the AC adaptor to a ceiling-mounted AC outlet, as the weight of the adaptor may cause it to become disconnected.
- If the unit is connected to a PBX system, please contact your PBX supplier.

#### Note for battery installation

 Use the supplied rechargeable batteries.
 For replacement, we recommend using the Panasonic rechargeable batteries noted on page 3, 6.

#### Note for battery charging

- It is normal for the handset to feel warm during charging.
- Clean the charge contacts of the handset, base unit, and charger with a soft and dry cloth once a month. Before cleaning the unit, disconnect from power outlets and any telephone line cords. Clean more often if the unit is exposed to grease, dust, or high humidity.





## Other settings

#### Eco mode setting

You can select the desired eco mode setting by pressing **[R/ECO]**.

The following settings are available for eco mode.

- "Eco": Reduces the base unit transmission power by up to 90 % in standby mode.
   When this setting is selected, ECO is displayed on the handset display instead of ♥.
- "Eco Off" (default setting): Turns off eco mode.

When this setting is selected, **ECO** is not displayed in the handset display.

#### Note:

- When there is another cordless phone in use nearby, the base unit transmission power may not be reduced. (KX-TGC412)
- When eco mode is active, the range of the base unit is reduced in standby mode.
- If you set repeater mode to "on" (page 23):
  - Eco mode is disabled.
  - "Eco Mode" is not displayed in the display menu (page 19).

#### **Dialling mode**

If you cannot make calls, change this setting according to your telephone line service. The default setting is "Tone".

"Tone": For tone dial service.

"Pulse": For rotary/pulse dial service.

## Making calls

   Speak alternately with the other party.

## Adjusting the receiver or speaker volume

Press [] or [] repeatedly while talking.

#### Making a call using the redial list

The last 10 phone numbers dialled are stored in the redial list (each 24 digits max.).

#### Erasing a number in the redial list

## Pause (for PBX/long distance service users)

A pause is sometimes required when making calls using a PBX or long distance service. When storing a calling card access number and/or PIN in the phonebook, a pause is also needed (page 17). **Example:** If you need to dial the line access number "0" when making outside calls with a PBX:

- 1  $0 \rightarrow [\blacktriangle]$  (Pause)
- 2 Dial the phone number.  $\rightarrow$  [ $\frown$ ]

#### Note:

• A 3 second pause is inserted each time [ ] (Pause) is pressed.

## **Answering calls**

- 1 Lift the handset and press [ ♠] or [♠] when the unit rings.
- When you finish talking, press [ ] or place the handset on the base unit or charger.

Any key answer: You can answer the call by pressing any dial key.

Auto talk: You can answer calls simply by lifting the handset (page 19).

**Temporary handset ringer off:** You can turn the ringer off temporarily by pressing [ $\alpha$ ].

#### Adjusting the ringer volume

Press [▲] or [▼] repeatedly to select the desired volume while ringing.

## Useful features during a call

#### Hold

- 1 Press [III] during an outside call.
- 2  $[\clubsuit]: "Hold" \rightarrow [OK]$
- 3 To release hold, press [ >>].

#### Note:

 After holding for 10 minutes, the call is disconnected.

#### Mute

Press (𝔄) during a call.

#### Making/Answering Calls

2 To return to the call, press [3].

#### **Recall/flash**

[R/ECO] allows you to use the special features of your host PBX such as transferring an extension call, or accessing optional telephone services.

#### Note:

 To change the recall/flash time, see page 20.

## For call waiting or Call Waiting Caller ID service users

To use call waiting or Call Waiting Caller ID, you must first subscribe with your phone service provider.

This feature allows you to receive calls while you are already talking on the phone. If you receive a call while on the phone, you will hear a call waiting tone.

If you subscribe to both Caller ID and Call Waiting with Caller ID services, the 2nd caller's information is displayed on the unit that is in use after you hear the call waiting tone.

- 1 Press [R/ECO] to answer the 2nd call.
- 2 To switch between calls, press [R/ECO].

 Please contact your phone service provider for details and availability of this service in your area.

## Temporary tone dialling (for rotary/pulse service users)

Press ★ before entering access numbers which require tone dialling.

## Transferring calls, conference calls

Available for:

Outside calls can be transferred or a conference call with an outside party can be made between 2 handsets.

- 1 During an outside call, press [ ()].
- Wait for the paged party to answer.
   If the paged party does not answer, press [ ] to return to the outside call.
- 3 To complete the transfer: Press [ ]. To establish a conference call:

 $[\blacksquare] \rightarrow [\diamondsuit]$ : "Conference"  $\rightarrow [OK]$ 

- To leave the conference, press [ ]. The other 2 parties can continue the conversation.
- To put the outside call on hold: [III] → [\$]: "Hold" → [OK] To resume the conference: [III] → [\$]: "Conference" → [OK]
- To cancel the conference: [Ⅲ] →
   [♠]: "Stop Conference" → [OK]
   You can continue the conversation

#### Intercom

Available for: KX-TGC412

Intercom calls can be made between handsets.

#### Note:

- When paging the handset, the paged handset beeps for 1 minute.
- If you receive an outside call while talking on the intercom, the interrupt tone sounds. To finish intercom, press [ ]. To answer the call, press [ ].

#### Making an intercom call

- 1 [()]
- 2 When you finish talking, press [ 7].

#### Answering an intercom call

- 1 Press [ ] to answer the page.
- 2 When you finish talking, press [ 7 ].

## **Key lock**

The handset can be locked so that no calls or settings can be made. Incoming calls can be answered, but all other functions are disabled while key lock is on.

To turn key lock on, press [III] for about 3 seconds.

• To turn key lock off, press [**--O**] for about 3 seconds.

Note:

 Calls to emergency numbers cannot be made until key lock is turned off.

## Power backup operation

When a power failure occurs, the charged handset temporarily supplies power to the base unit (power backup mode). This allows you to make and receive calls using a handset during a power failure. The base unit will not perform any other functions. You can program "Power Failure" and the default setting is "Auto" (page 20).

#### Important:

 If a handset is not placed on the base unit when a power failure occurs, "Base no

power Press T is displayed. After pressing T in the handset, place it on the base unit to start power backup mode.

- Power backup mode will not work if the battery level of the power supplying handset is \vert \v
- Do not lift the power supplying handset from the base unit during power backup mode.

#### Panasonic Ni-MH battery performance (supplied batteries) during power backup mode

When the batteries are fully charged, operating time of the handset in power backup mode varies depending on usage.

- Continuous use of the handset in power backup mode: 2 hours max.
- Continuous use of the handset other than a handset in power backup mode: 3 hours max.
- Not in use in power backup mode: 3 hours max.

#### Making calls during a power failure

#### When only 1 handset is registered:

- 1 Lift the handset and dial the phone number.
- 2 Within 1 minute, place the handset on the base unit.
  - Wait until speakerphone is turned on automatically and the call is made.
- 3 When the other party answers the call, keep the handset on the base unit and talk using the speakerphone.
- 4 When you finish talking, press [ ].
- When 2 or more handsets are registered: You should leave one handset on the base unit for supplying power, and use another handset for making calls.

#### Note:

 The range of the base unit is limited during a power failure. Please use the handset close to the base unit.

#### **Caller ID features**

When an outside call is being received, the caller information is displayed. Caller information for the last 50 callers is

logged in the caller list from the most recent call to the oldest.

- If the unit cannot receive caller information, the following is displayed:
  - "Out of Area": The caller dials from an area which does not provide a Caller ID service.
  - "Private Caller": The caller requests not to send caller information.
- If the unit is connected to a PBX system, caller information may not be properly received. Contact your PBX supplier.

#### Missed calls

If a call is not answered, the unit treats it as a missed call and  $\Rightarrow$  is displayed. This lets you know if you should view the caller list to see who called while you were away. Even if only one missed call in the caller list is viewed (page 25),  $\Rightarrow$  disappears from the display. When you receive another new call,  $\Rightarrow$ ) is displayed again.

Note:

- Even when there are unviewed missed calls, disappears from the standby display if the following operation is performed by one of the registered handsets:
  - Being replaced on the base unit or charger.
  - Pressing [ ].

## **Character entry**

The dial keys are used to enter characters and numbers. Each dial key has multiple characters assigned to it. The characters that can be entered depend on the character entry mode (page 27).

- Press [] or [] to move the cursor left or right.
- Press dial keys to enter characters and numbers.
- Press [C] to erase the character or number highlighted by the cursor. Press and hold [C] to erase all characters or numbers.
